In its preface to the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, Congress declared that the preservation of historic properties "is in the public interest so that its vital legacy of cultural, educational, aesthetic, inspirational, economic, energy benefits will be maintained and enriched for future generations of Americans."

Carthage enjoys a rich history which is reflected in the many structures found throughout the city. The Jasper County Courthouse, buildings on the Square, Boots Motel and the Phelps House, to name just a few, all have a story to tell about the Carthaginians who came before us, and the events that helped to shape the city of Carthage.

Carthage Historic Preservation was formed in 1978. Since its founding, CHP has established three historic districts with over 600 structures listed on the National Register, rehabilitated two Victorian properties Carthage Square, purchased and restored the historic Phelps House.

An excerpt from Benjamin Sweet's journal, Tuesday, September 10, 1867:

"Pleasant. Started quite early in the morning. After we had got about ten miles, we met woman - who had been to call her mother who was a hundred years old and had started to walk to her son's at distance of 15 miles - who asked us to let an old woman that was ahead of us ride a little way. When we got in sight of the old lady, she was so tired that she could scercly (sic) move. I lifted her into the wagon and carried her to her granddaughters, about 14 or 15 miles from where we found her. We took dinner there-Coon Creekand arrived in Carthage at four o-clock P.M."



THE SWEET HOUSE

CHP is excited about its newest project, the Sweet House, which is believed to be the OLDEST house still standing in Carthage. The house built was bv **BENJAMIN** G. **SWEET** a Civil (1838-1909), War veteran, carpenter, store owner and entrepreneur.

The land on which the house sits was part of an 1854 United States land grant to William Chenault. In 1868, **William Phelps** bought all of the property from 13th Street south to the north side of what is now the Phelps House property. The property abstract shows that in 1868 Phelps sold a parcel of land

on East 13th Street to Sweet who then built a house. Sweet sold the property to Edmund Webb in 1870 for \$1200, a sizeable profit above the \$375 in loans obtained by Sweet.

Over the years, Sweet worked in construction, as a grocer, owned a newsstand, and even tried his hand at owning a restaurant on the west side of the Square. According to family, he owned general stores in Kansas and Arkansas, and had a mining interest in Oklahoma.

BENJAMIN G. SWEET:

- married Inez Hall Sweet in 1866. He moved to Carthage with Inez and daughter, Minnie Elzora in 1867. A son, Clayton Clark, was born the following March.
- was a Civil War Veteran; a Union Soldier who served with the 74th Volunteer Illinois Infantry throughout the war despite suffering from chronic rheumatism.
- worked with brothers-in-law E.B. and E.H. Hall who were carpenters and builders in Carthage. According to a Carthage Press interview with Sweet's son, Clayton, "his father erected many of the early day residences in Carthage."

• kept journals, four of which were preserved and gifted to the State
Historical Society of Missouri by Sweet's granddaughter, Marcella E. Sweet Roper. These journals
describe his wartime experiences, travel to Carthage, and business challenges in 1872.

PHELPS HOUSE HISTORY

The land for the Phelps House was obtained in 1868 and the home was designed by Colonel William Phelps and completed in 1895 of grey Carthage marble, which was locally mined. The house has many unique features, such as original hand painted wallpaper, combination gas/electric chandeliers, a functioning dumbwaiter and a heated cloak closet.

Rich wood paneling, ten unique fireplaces of varying marble and tile, and beautiful stained glass windows are featured throughout the house.

The Ladies' Parlor showcases the original furniture purchased by the Phelps at the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair. Many of the additional furnishings and renovation of the



structure have been provided by generous contributors and friends of the Phelps House. Member dues and donations together with proceeds from tour fees and rentals are used by Carthage Historic Preservation to preserve and maintain the historic home.

In 2011, the roof of Phelps House was replaced with original style clay tiles which were produced by the same company who made the original tiles. The tiles come with a 75-year warranty! Other recent projects include repairing vents and moisture guards, installing period-appropriate guttering, and restoring and repairing plaster ceilings.

CARTHAGE MEMORIES

In a journal entry from Monday, May 27th, 1872, Benjamin Sweet shares that "It has been raining nearly every day for the last ten days and today at eleven o'clock, the Spring River began raising very fast...at 3 o'clock it had raised about fifteen feet covering the bottom...to Myer's Woolen Factory: the water carrying wood, rail fences and nearly every thing that stood in its course. A stream of persons from town have been going to and from the Woolen Mill to witness the water in Spring River higher than it was ever known to be before."

The weekly newspaper, *Carthage Banner*, reported that the river grew to be a mile wide and 30 feet deep. Nearly all of Carthage's population was out on the hills and bluffs to look at the grand sight, many arriving by carriage, and everyone expressing astonishment at how "the gentle, murmuring, lovely Spring River had in two hours time turned into a roaring, mighty river...." The loss of livestock and crops, fencing, wood, and other property was estimated to be over \$200,000.

Those words echo the experience of present-day Carthaginians who, on December 27, 2015, saw heavy rains and flooding of Spring River. That night the river crested at 20.24 feet. Our ancestors would no doubt have been expressing astonishment once again!
