

WHY HISTORIC PRESERVATION MATTERS TO CARTHAGE


When you hear the words "historic preservation," do you immediately think "snooze fest?" Do you immediately imagine little old ladies living in dusty Victorian homes with lots of lace and doilies everywhere? You probably aren't alone! However, in the interest of showing how relevant historic preservation is to you and to Carthage, here is a topten list of why preservation should and <u>does</u> matter.

1. Historic preservation means there are real "Places in the Heart" which are shared by a whole community. Its history and historical structures provide a community with


memories and a sense of identity and uniqueness. For example, who in Carthage doesn't identify with the Jasper County Courthouse? Or have memories of personal events tied to the Route 66 Drive In, Boots Court and Boots Drive-In,


the Carthage Square, to name just a few of our "Places in the Heart"?


2. Historic preservation encourages **heritage tourism**. Heritage visitors want to visit our kind of town, and they have a big impact on the local economy. They stay longer, spend more money, and *will spread the word and return if a community has something to offer*.



- 4. It contributes to **job creation**, for example renovation and construction work, tourism, small businesses, the service sector.
- 5. And as a result, **money stays in the community**!









- 9. Old buildings are very often works of art they bring **beauty to a community**, in many cases through artisan skills that no longer exist.
- 10. Historic preservation **educates us** historic structures and places tell us about our past. There are lessons to be learned from the geography of a battlefield, the physical location of a building, the building materials and ornate workmanship (or not) of an old home, servants' quarters (or not), the hitching post out front...they all tell us how our forbearers lived and died.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION MATTERS TO CARTHAGE!



Lillian James & Co., a new business at 149 E. 3rd Street on the northeast side of the Carthage Square, illustrates how historic preservation and a sensibility can blend modern beautifully to provide aesthetically pleasing and economically viable use of an historic building.

Becky Andrews, her daughter Cassandra Andrews, and business partner, Ashley Calliotte, approached the renovation of the building with the goal of maintaining the integrity and character of the 1880 Sheetrock removed from the walls building. revealed the original brick walls. Original Carthage marble found in the basement once again graces the lower portion of the interior front walls. Five layers of flooring were removed to reveal a wood floor beyond repair, however, care was taken to install a floor that resembles the original. Removing the first-floor dropped ceiling led to a decision to stain and leave the original ceiling joists exposed which contributes to the historic feel. The old glass and metal entry door was replaced with a new churchstyle arched mahogany door which complements

the building and interior.

In 1841, this corner lot sold for \$44, the most expensive real estate on the Square. The brick building was constructed in 1880 and later resurfaced with Carthage marble. Still visible to the left of the iron piece is one of the original iron pillars made by Carthage Foundry.

Searching for items to decorate the interior, Becky and Cassie found wooden brackets and pendant lighting salvaged from an old St. Louis Catholic church. The distinctive iron piece on the front of the building was salvaged from a Joplin restaurant.

The second floor of the building is occupied by Life Captured Photography. Unfortunately, at some point the original tin ceiling was removed. It has been replicated by W.F. Norman Corp. located in Nevada, Missouri, using the same machinery and production methods from 1898 to produce tin ceiling tiles.

This historic building is home to a small business providing **jobs** (local Carthage workers completed much of the renovation work) and keeping money in the community. Maintaining the integrity of the building while renovating the interior to meet the needs of a full-service beauty salon will impact positively on its property value as well as other buildings on the Square. The renovation undertaken by Lillian James & Co. epitomizes the green movement by reclaiming, reusing and recycling architectural elements to beautify the building, their business, and the Carthage Square, which contributes to the livability of Carthage. Lillian James & Co. exemplifies why historic preservation matters to Carthage!



NEED ANOTHER REASON WHY PRESERVATION MATTERS?

The destruction of an old structure is IRREVERSIBLE! And some of the materials may not even exist anymore (e.g., wood from the American chestnut tree.)



Cassil Place

Some homes still exist but in 1957 the Highway Department took 3 rows of trees on each side of the road and most of the lawns for Highway 96/ Central Avenue. What a difference a highway makes.



Cuban Mahogany

Due to over-harvesting and high demand, Cuban mahogany such as that found in the Phelps House has been commercially extinct for over 100 years. It is protected by an international treaty and what still grows cannot be cut down.



First National Bank

A very fine example of Richardsonian Romanesque architecture. The building was demolished in the 1960's.
